





RCA Member TRAVELOGUE

Artist's residency in Ireland, 2010

We drove from Dublin to Ballycastle, County Mayo, on the west coast of Ireland in sheets of horizontal rain on the narrowest roads in the world on the blackest of November nights, finally arriving at the Ballinglen Arts Foundation where I was to spend the next six weeks as a resident artist. Six weeks of dramatic weather, wild winds and storms that brought in forty-foot waves.

This is Yeats and Joyce country, with ever-changing skies and the mystical light of the Northern Romantics. I was given a welcoming cottage along with a well-equipped printmaking facility, a s ky-lit studio and several other artists with whom to share the experience. A residency takes you away from your habitual life, shakes it all up and deposits you on the other side with a whole lot of new work and many, many impressions. It is stimulating, challenging, and sometimes difficult.

It strips you of habitual ways of working and forces you to look at yourself and your work from a different perspective. It is intense; there are none of the daily distractions. You are given an opportunity to just work, and by the end of the six weeks you are a well-oiled art machine, which in itself is an affirming experience, and you remember how important it is to just work in a prolonged, concentrated way.

These conditions, along with the savage beauty of the surrounding count ryside, the pathos of the poetry and music and the intriguing history of a 5000 year-old people, have left me with a wealth of impressions: stories, memories, new friends and a mild addiction to Guinness.

Wychwood Park : An Artists' Community

As one of Toronto's ealiest planned communities, Wychwood Park was founded by Marmaduke Matthews RCA, a landscape painter who purchased land here in the 1870's with the hope of establishing an artist colony at Wychwood Park. Matthews named Wychwood Park after Wychwood Forest, located near his childhood home in Oxfordshire, England.

In 1874, Matthews built the first house in the community, at number six Wychwood Park. The second Wychwood Park house, at number twenty-two Wychwood Park, was built in 1877, by Matthews' friend Alexander Jardine. Matthews and Jardine jointly bought the land that abutted their estates and in 1891, registered a plan of subdivision for what is now the Wychwood Park neighbourhood. Other famous residents included Marshall McLuhan in the 1970's.

The Wychwood Park neighbourhood was designated as an Ontario Heritage Conservation district in 1985.

Regional Highlights

MANITOBA Etienne Gaboury RCA (MB): Mr. Gaboury received the Order of Canada on November 17th, 2010.

CLOSE ENCOUNTERS: The Next 500 Years International Exhibition of Contemporary Indigenous Art

Organized by Winnipeg's Plug In ICA, Winnipeg Art Gallery and Urban Shaman, the exhibition opened January 22, continuing to May 8, 2011. Close Encounters is the culmination of Winnipeg's year as the 2010 Cultural Capital of Canada, Close Encounters includes 33 aboriginal artists from six countries.

The world is at a crossroads in many ways. Climate change, economic meltdowns, post-colonialism and globalization it's hard to imagine what the future will look like. Close Encounters asks indigenous artists to consider this future, taking into account the realities of our modern world, and reflecting on the histories with which we still struggle.

Canada is represented by Mary Anne Barkhouse RCA, Michael Belmore RCA, and Rebecca Belmore RCA as well as other Canadian aboriginal artists.

Mary Anne Barkhouse's installation The Four Horses of the Apocalypse and The Donkey of Eternal Salvation (see insert), brings new perspective to the riders of pending doom. Here the nightmarish myth of the Book of Revelation is represented by four immaculately restored coin-operated tov horses the kind of 60s era kiddie rides – outfitted in custom-made regalia. Each horse bears a different animal crest bees and vultures; pelicans, starnosed moles with an oil pumpjack; sea lions and a Japanese whaling ship; skidders, tractors and a man with a chainsaw grafted onto his arm.

Clearly we have a lot to be accountable for in terms of our actions on, above and below the planet.

Robert Enright, in his February 7 Globe and Mail review said, "The stories being told in this landmark exhibition are less narratives of resistance and imposed accommodations than stories of adaptation and self-directed transformation. The artists in Close Encounters are fully aware of the need to renegotiate the terms of engagement as they head fullbodied into the next 500 years".

Choices , possibilities and ambiguitiy for the future are contained in Michael Belmore's *Smoulder*, a seductive fire whose imaginary heat comes from a floor sculpture made of carved stones and copper leaf . The work alludes to an extinguished flame and the hope or regeneration through fire, the site of beginnings and ends.

Wanda Koop: On the Edge of Experience National Gallery of Canada, 18 February - 15 May 2011

A major survey exhibition of the work of Wanda Koop RCA (AB) produced over the last 25 years. The exhibition will illustrate the Winnipeg artist's ongoing take on how technology impacts nature by drawing together not only her large plywood paintings from the 1980s with her more recent work, but by restaging past exhibitions in miniature and even recreating the artist's own studio.

Throughout her career, Wanda Koop has become known for creating environments with her paintings to allow her works to play off the space where they are viewed. Through the use of detailed scale models, visitors to the exhibition will be able to experience 16 of these previous signature installations, which could not otherwise have been simultaneously restaged at the National Gallery of Canada.



"Wanda Koop's work is both intimidating and disarming at the same time" said NGC Director Marc Mayer. "It seems to have been done with such facility and ease you might imagine making them yourself, but they're so graphically powerful you're overwhelmed by them and the sheer courage of the scale..."

Co-organized with the Winnipeg Art Gallery, this exhibition promises a compelling 25-year view of this artist's 40-year career with works from a variety of different series, shown together for the first time.

Wanda Koop graduated in 1973 from the Lemoine Fitzgerald School of Art, University of Manitoba. Among her many other honours and awards, Koop was appointed a member of the Order of Canada in 2006, and elected to the Royal Canadian Academy of Arts in 2005.

ALBERTA Helena Hadala RCA (AB) Selected by jury to take part in the Can Serrat International Artist Residency located in El Bruc, Spain for the month of April 2011.

Liz Ingram RCA (AB): Elected a fellow of the Royal Society of Canada in 2009 and was named a **Distinguished University Professor** at the University of Alberta. Current exhibition titled *Perceptions of Promise: Biotechnology, Society & Art* at the Glenbow Museum, Calgary January 6th - March 20th. Ms. Ingram was also awarded a large public commission for the Jubilee Auditorium in Calgary to be installed April 2011.

Mr. Hosaluk will give an Artist Talk in English on Friday, April 8 at 12:30 p.m. Michael Hosaluk is an internationally recognized woodworker who has won Canada's highest fine craft honour, the Saidye Bronfman Award. In his series Acts of Chairs, Hosaluk takes the chair as his point of departure, "liberating" it from its function by making it an outline building block. The public is invited to interact with the chair units to create larger sculptures.

is exhibiting at the **12th Annual John Aird Gallery RCA Exhibition** with a work on Brain Synapses, and in Baltimore in the **Women of The Book** exhibition taking place at the **Park School Gallery**. In addition, Ms. Gagnon's 2011 artist book is entitled *Things and Thoughts*.

RCA Recipients of 2011 Governor-General's Awards for excellence in visual and media arts

On March 23rd, the eight recipients of the 2011 Govemor–General's Awards for excellence in visual and media arts will receive theirs from Governor-General David Johnston at a ceremony at **Rideau Hall.**

Among the recipients are Academicians Genevieve Cadieux RCA (QC), honoured for her experimental photo based works, and Michael Morris RCA, a Vancouver artist working in multimedia art production, curating and performance art.

The eight recipients of the 2011 Governor General awards include Calgary art critic/journalist Nancy Tousley, winner of the "outstanding achievement" award. Nancy Tousley has written about the RCA, notably her article in Canadian Art about the Academy's millennial exhibition, Arts2000, in Stratford, ON

In keeping with RCA tradition we are very pleased that His Excellency the **Right Honourable David Johnston**, Governor General of Canada, has accepted our invitation to be patron of the Royal Canadian Academy of Arts.

David Blackwood RCA (ON) **Black Ice Prints of Newfoundland** Art Gallery of Ontario, Feb. 5 - June 12, 2011

David Blackwood is one of Canada's leading printmakers and most popular artists. This exhibition showcases some iconic works for the first time, revealing the richness of Blackwood's imagination and his working methods. Blackwood has been telling stories about Newfoundland in the form of epic visual narratives for 30 years. Blackwood explores the timeless theme of the struggle for survival between humans and the nature in one of the most exposed and hostile environments on earth.

He has created an iconography of Newfoundland which is as universal as it is personal. The exhibition draws on childhood memories, dreams, superstitions, legends, the oral tradition, and political realities of the Wesleyville community on Bonavista Bay where Blackwood was born and raised.

A book *Black Ice: David Blackwood – Prints of Newfoundland*, has been published to coincide with the exhibition.



Johnson Chou RCA (ON)

Interior Design Magazine has given its Best of Year award to interior designer Johnson Chou RCA for his exciting & dynamic space for Red Bull Canada on Queen Street West in Toronto. Designed to express Red Bull's support for the visual arts and music community, the project was completed in two phases; the Music Academy for a one year duration, and the new Red Bull Headquarters which followed in August 2010. The new space features a "Memento Wall", a two-storey surface containing collected objects, including DVDs, CDs and other ephemera inspirational to the participating artists during their time at the Music Academy. 0

Rare Sculptures Saved by Newfoundland Artist (photo pge 3)

Hamilton, Ontario – A Newfoundland artist has played a significant role in an historical fine arts preservation movement where 8 important historical relief sculptures in Hamilton, have been saved from demolition.

On Friday February 11, 2001 the noted Canadian sculptor and Corner Brook resident Christian Corbet was the Guest of Honour in Hamilton give a lecture on the art of his mentor, artist **Dr. Elizabeth Bradford Holbrook, RCA.** Corbet was lauded in a letter from Bob Bratina, Mayor of Hamilton, and introduced to the press and guests as Dr. Elizabeth Bradford Holbrook's sole protégé. Corbet's lecture included a visual present ation with quotes from colleagues and friends of Corbet's who were in support of saving the relief sculptures. Corbet secured attention, support and even quotes from the National Gallery of Canada, Royal Canadian Academy of Arts, and the Art Gallery of Ont ario among other important institutions and influential people across Canada and abroad. The eight stone relief architectural panels measure approximately 24" x 36" and depict "Canadian Industry" and "Canadian Wildlife". The sculptures were carved by Dr. Holbrook between 1951 and 1953. She was awa rded the Order of Canada for her contributions to sculpture.

Councillor Jason Farr spoke of the importance of the architectural sculptures and stated that Vrancor Development Corp. was saving all eight of the sculptures and was donating the panels to the City of Hamilton.

David Sorensen RCA 1937-2011



It is with great sadness that we announce the passing of Montreal artist David Sorensen. Surrounded by immediate family, David passed away peacefully in his home on Thursday, February 17.

Born in Vancouver in 1937, Sorensen first studied architecture with Arthur Erickson and then returned to study at the Vancouver School of Art with Jack Shadbolt and sculptor Bill Reid. Shadbolt, who studied with painter Hans Hoffman, invited the renowned American art critic Clement Greenberg to the school to discuss abstract art.

These discussions along with an earlier trip to Europe to see the Abstract Expressionist paintings of Rothko, deKooning, Pollock and Kline influenced Sorensen's decision to become a full-time artist.

In 1962 he visited Mexico, where he had his first solo exhibition in Mexico City in 1964. Sorensen was attracted to the work of Quebec artists Jean-Paul Riopelle and Armand Vaillancourt and moved to Montreal where he taught, painted and exhibited frequently. Sorensen, now Professor Emeritus, taught visual art at Bishop's University from 1981-2000.

Over Sorensen's long career he had countless exhibitions across Canada and has shown his work in Switzerland, France, Italy, Japan, China and the US. In 2005, the Musee du Bas Saint-Laurent in Riviere-du-Loup, QC curated a 45 year retrospective of Sorensen's work. In 2007 (and 2010) Sorensen exhibited large works at the Mexican Embassy Gallery 'Espacio Mexico' in Montreal and had paintings from his Horizon Series sent on a tour of museums and cultural centers throughout Mexico.

His generous spirit and gentle nature will be missed tremendously.

A memorial service will be held : Friday April 8th, 2011 5:00-8:00pm Consulado General de Mexico en Montreal, 2055 Peele Street, Montreal.
